

PARLIAMENTARY OBSERVATORY OF THE UNIVERSAL PERIODIC REVIEW

The Universal Periodic Review (UPR) is a mechanism for assessing the human rights situation in the 193 member states of the United Nations (UN).

The UPR Parliamentary Observatory was established from the partnership between the House of Representatives and the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights and aims to:

increase national engagement with human rights mechanisms;

contribute to collecting information and good practices;

increase knowledge about UN human rights mechanisms and their relevance; and

increase the use of results from human rights mechanisms among legislators.

 Ordinance No. 288/2018, from the Ministry of Human Rights, provides for procedures for signing a term of commitment with business within the scope of the Program for the Protection of Human Rights Defenders.

Ordinance No. 289/2018, of the Ministry of Human Rights, establishes the Businesses and Human Rights Committee.

NOVEMBER/2018

Ordinance No. 350/2018, from the Ministry of Human Rights, establishes the Code of Conduct and Respect for Human Rights for Suppliers of Goods and Services.

Decree No. 9,751/2018 establishes the National Guidelines on Business and Human Rights and adopts the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights.

MARCH/2020
